hostess



Perennial favorties include her New Year's Day "Pajamas & Pancakes" party and "Jambalaya Jams" for 50 guests (all cooked up with a big assist from her husband, John).

Such events allow Trigg to showcase the couple's 3,900-square-foot, 105-yearold home boasting a wrap-around porch with sweeping views of the adjacent park.

Best of all for Trigg, who's carved out a successful specialty planning "green" events, gatherings in her Grant Park home mean there's no jet fuel expended. Trigg is founder of Eventologie, a self-styled "eco-fabulous" event company she created in 2004.

Although she got her start planning weddings. Trigg said today spends about 75 percent of her time on large national nonprofit clients, many with a "green focus."

National clients include the National Recycling Coalition, U.S. Green Building Council and Robert Kennedy Jr.'s Waterkeeper Alliance.

Locally, Trigg works extensively




APRIL MILLIKEN TRIGG'S FIVE TIPS FOR SETTING A SUSTAINABLE TABLE

- Set your "stage" with a tablecloth. Linens are reusable and can be an easy and affordable way to begin creating your look by finding a color, pattern or texture that is different and fun. Trigg recommends the selections at Crate & Barrel and Target.
- 2. To spruce up a basic tablecloth, create your own table runner. Head to your local craft shop and look for a wide ribbon (2-inches-by-4-inches is great). Wired ribbon is a plus and avoid satin if possible, so it won't easily slip off your table. Tartan plaid (very popular in fashion right now) is a great choice. Easily cut two runners by measuring the length of your table and cutting three-quarters from table top to floor. Placing them asymmetrically will add a bit of dimension and interest.
- 3. Use the china, glass and silver you registered for and go "greent" Reusable serving ware is the key. Change the look of your basic white china by adding a charger. Target has an array of choices, especially around the holidays. Coordinate your charger with a colorful wine or champagne glass; a goldor silver-rimmed glass shows you planned a smart table.
- 4. To create a beautiful, fragrant and sustainable centerpiece, pick up a flowering plant instead of cut flowers that won't last much past your dinner party. Home Degot always has a great selection of flowering plants, depending on the season, Orchids can always be found and, with proper care, can last years. Find continued on page 25
